I struggle with trying to prepare her while knowing that I can't. I struggle with knowing she's going to absolutely love being around other kids her age, but also knowing that she has no inkling of the journey she's about to begin.

I struggle to be excited for her in front of her and only to worry when she's not around.

I've never done this before. Kent didn't go anywhere for kindergarten (because of covid), I struggled differently back then.

We are the hopeful, excited, anxious, and maybe even scared kid that'll be walking beside her. She's going to be great, and so will we.

I share this with you because I know that each of you understands these emotions all too well. Your work is not just about imparting knowledge; it's about guiding our children and their families through these important transitions.

We are here today because we share a common belief: that education is one of the most powerful tools we can provide to our children. It shapes not only their minds but their character, values, and future. You, as educators, administrators, support staff, counselors, on and on, are the stewards of this great responsibility, and I can't express enough how much we value your dedication, passion, and expertise.
